Frank Ernest HUPPATZ

Frank Ernest Huppertz was born at Saddleworth, South Australia on 25th April, 1893 to parents Frederick August & Anna Huppertz (nee Kamenka).

Frank Ernest Huppertz attended the Public School at Saddleworth, South Australia.

Frank Ernest Huppertz was a 22 year old, single, Farmer from Saddleworth, South Australia when he enlisted in Adelaide, South Australia on 10th April, 1916 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His religion was Church of England & his next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs A. Huppertz, from Saddleworth, South Australia.

A letter written by Recruiting Sergeant on District Council of Saddleworth letterhead, dated 7th April, 1916 reads: *“The bearer “Frank Huppertz” was passed as medically Fit, at Currie St on Jan the 8th. But was rejected because of Alien Origin. He was approved by the D.C. on Jan 20th (see letter) but owing to some oversight, the papers never reached this office.”*

Private Frank Ernest Huppertz was posted to “B” Company, 2nd Depot on 25th April, 1916 for recruit training. He was transferred to 19th Reinforcements of 10th Battalion on 1st May, 1916 at Mitcham then on 16th June, 1916 he was transferred to 18th Reinforcements of 10th Battalion. Private Huppertz entrained on 24th June, 1916 to 3rd Military District for embarkation on *Barambah*.

Private Frank Ernest Huppertz, Service number 5840, embarked from Melbourne, Victoria on HMAT *Barambah* (A37) on 27th June, 1916 with the 10th Infantry Battalion, 18th Reinforcements & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 25th August, 1916.

10th Battalion

The 10th Battalion was among the first infantry units raised for the AIF during the First World War. The battalion was recruited in South Australia, and together with the 9th, 11th and 12th Battalions, formed the 3rd Brigade.....

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private Frank Ernest Huppertz was marched in to 3rd Training Battalion at Perham Camp No. 6, Wiltshire, England on 26th August, 1916 from Australia.

Private Frank Ernest Huppertz was taken on strength of 43rd Battalion on 23rd September, 1916 from Training Battalion.

43rd Battalion

The 3rd Division was raised in Australia early in 1916. The 43rd Battalion was South Australia's contribution to the strength of the division. Along with the 41st, 42nd, and 44th Battalions, plus support troops, it formed the 11th Brigade.

The battalion embarked in June 1916 and, after landing briefly in Egypt, went on to Britain for further training. The battalion arrived on the Western Front in late December.....

Private Frank Ernest Huppertz was admitted to Field Hospital at Larkhill, Wiltshire on 28th September, 1916 then transferred to 1st Australian Dermatological Hospital, Bulford, Wiltshire on 30th September, 1916 with VD. He was discharged on 13th December, 1916 – Total period VD – 79 days.

Private Frank Ernest Huppatz was admitted to Military Hospital, Tidworth, Wiltshire on 15th December, 1916 with Tubercle of Lung from 11th Training Battalion, Durrington, Wiltshire. (The Hospital Admissions form recorded he was transferred to Tidworth General on 13th December, 1916 from Military Hospital Bulford).

Private Frank Ernest Huppatz died at 7.15 pm on 16th December, 1916 at Tidworth Military Hospital, Wiltshire, England from "*Acute Phohisis*" (as listed incorrectly on "Report of Death of a Soldier" – Army Form B. 2090; Casualty Form – Active Service. Statement of Service Form & in a letter to Mrs A. Huppatz, mother of the late soldier). A Telegram sent from Senior Medical Officer at Tidworth on 16th December, 1916 to Administrative Headquarters, A.I.F. London, advised that Private Frank Huppatz was dangerously ill with acute phthisis (but incorrectly listed his surname as "*Uppatz*" & his battalion as 41st. A correction was sent the next day). Further advice advised that Private Huppatz had died from Acute Phthisis. The Hospital Admissions form recorded he had been admitted with Tubercle of Lung & died on 16th December, 1916 "*having been in hospital 24 hours.*"

A death for Frank E. Huppatz, aged 23, was registered in the December quarter, 1916 in the district of Andover, Hampshire, England.

Private Frank Ernest Huppatz was buried in Tidworth Military Cemetery, Wiltshire, England – Plot number C. 230 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

Mr August Huppatz, Saddleworth, father of the late Private Frank Ernest Huppatz, wrote to Base Records on 22nd February, 1917 with the following letter: "*My son Private Frank Ernest Huppatz No 5840 of the 31st Battalion A.I.F. died at the Delhi Hospital London on the 27th December 1916. In going into his affairs I find that a small life insurance is now payable, but the Company concerned will not entertain the claim unto a Certificate of death is produced. Would you be goo enough to supply me with one. My son embarked from Melbourne but enlisted in S.A.*"

Base Records replied to Mr A. Huppatz, Saddleworth, S.A., on 27th February, 1917 enclosing as requested a certificate of report of death of the late No. 5840 Private F. E. Huppatz, 43rd Battalion.

Private Frank Ernest Huppatz was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Huppatz's father – Mr A. Huppatz, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent April, 1922 & Plaque sent July, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Frank Ernest Huppatz – service number 5840, aged 23, of 43rd Battalion, Australian Infantry. He was the son of Frederick August & Anna Huppatz, of Saddleworth, South Australia.

Private F. E. Huppatz is commemorated on the Roll of Honour, located in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 136.

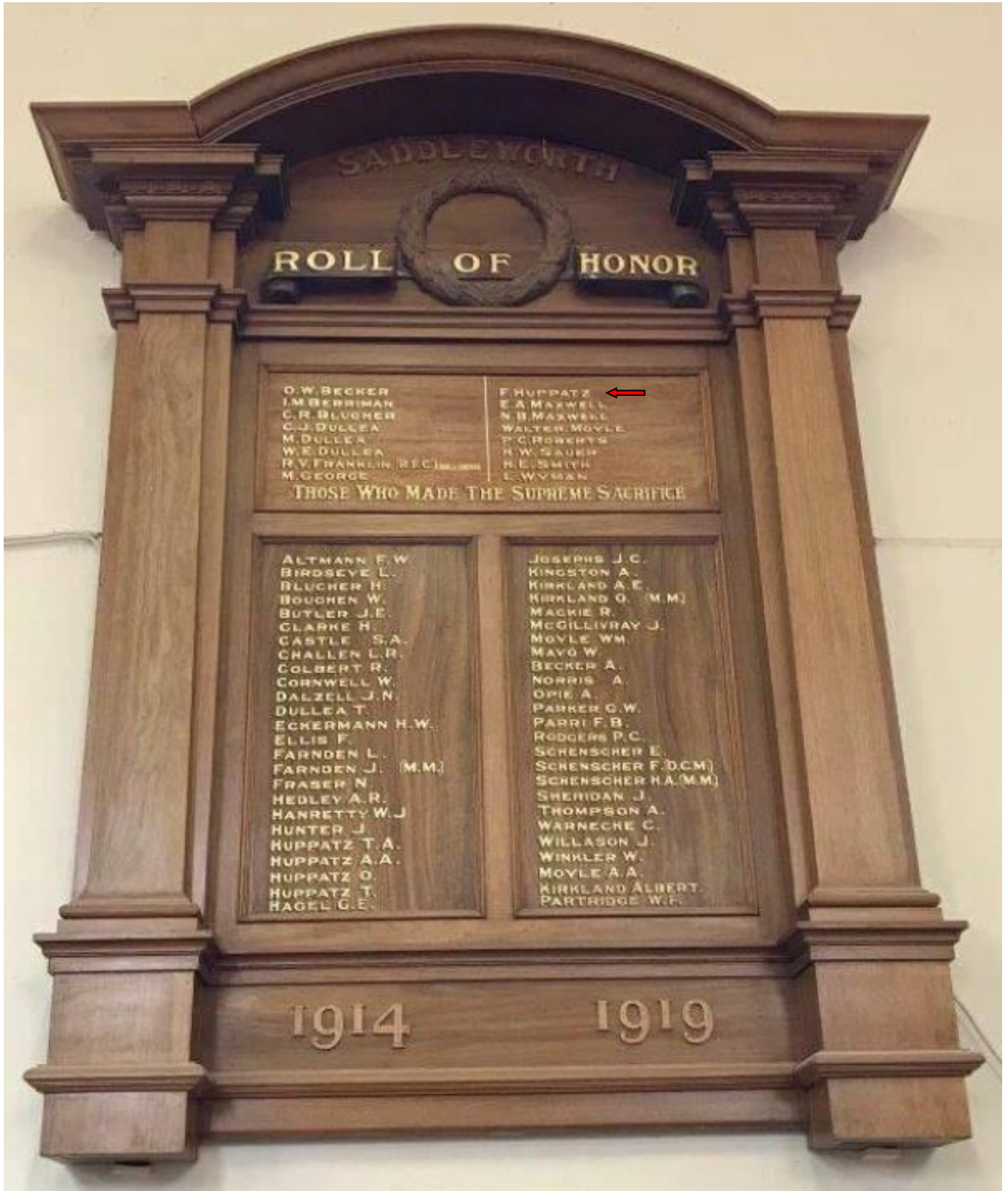

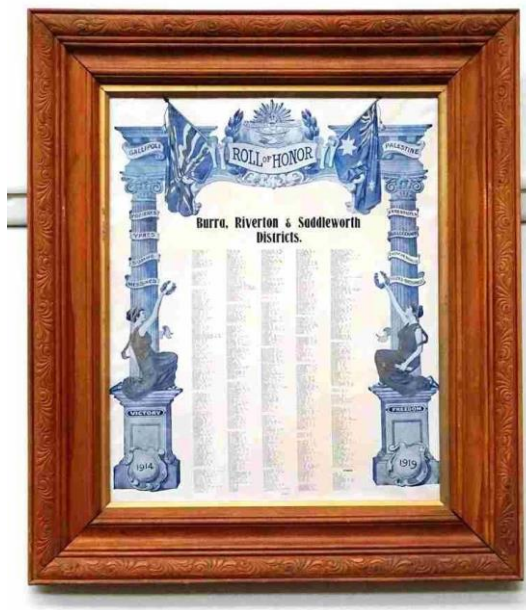

The deceased was a fine sportsman of splendid physique, and was widely known in the norther districts as a footballer. His kindly disposition made him many friends and the deepest sympathy is felt for his parents and their family, who are among the oldest and most respected residents in the district.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

Tidworth Military Cemetery, which contains burials of both wars, was directly connected with training grounds on, or near, Salisbury Plain.

During the First World War, the cemetery was used for burials from Tidworth and Fargo Military Hospitals and the 417 graves, many of them of Australian or New Zealand servicemen, are scattered throughout the cemetery.

There are 106 Second World War graves in the cemetery, two substantial groups of which can be found in sections F and D. The rest are scattered.

The cemetery also contains 40 war graves of other nationalities, many of them Polish.
