Ernest Richardson McCOMB

Ernest Richardson McComb was born at Frankston, Victoria on 6th June, 1896 to parents Thomas Kerr McComb & Harriet McComb (nee Bentick).

Ernest Richardson McComb attended the State School at Frankston, Victoria.

Ernest Richardson McComb was a 20 year old, single, Horse Trainer from Carr Street, Frankston, Victoria when he enlisted on 26th November, 1915 with the 8th Field Artillery Brigade, 1st Reinforcements of the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 22927 & his religion was Presbyterian. His next of kin was listed as his father – Mr T. K. McComb, of Carr Street, Frankston, Victoria.

Private Ernest Richardson McComb was posted to 23rd Battalion at Royal Park on 4th January, 1916. He was transferred to Field Artillery Reinforcements as Gunner on 8th January, 1916. Gunner Ernest McComb was transferred to 8th Field Artillery Brigade, 1st Reinforcements on 1st April, 1916.

Gunner Ernest Richardson McComb embarked from Melbourne on HMAT *Medic* (A7) on 20th May, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 18th July, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Gunner Ernest Richardson McComb was marched out to Larkhill, Wiltshire from Parkhouse, Wiltshire on 2nd August, 1916.

Gunner Ernest Richardson McComb was transferred to 3rd D.A.C. (Divisional Ammunition Column) on 4th October, 1916 & mustered as Driver on 5th October, 1916.

Driver Ernest Richardson McComb proceeded overseas to France on 24th November, 1916.

Driver Ernest Richardson McComb was taken to Hospital sick on 29th November, 1916 with appendicitis. He was transferred from Divisional Rest Station to Australian Casualty Clearing Station on 1st December, 1916. Pte McComb was transferred & admitted to 13th General Hospital at Boulogne, France on 2nd December, 1916. He embarked for England from Boulogne on Hospital Ship *Jan Breydel* on 3rd December, 1916 with appendicitis.

Driver Ernest Richardson McComb was admitted to Military Hospital, Chatham, Kent, England on 4th December, 1916 with appendicitis. The Hospital report states that "*During convalescence had attacks of headache (acute) & vomiting at intervals of 4 or 5 days. Very severe attack on 8.1.17 & suddenly collapsed & died.*" Post Mortem found a "*small cystic _____ in anterior edge of liver & a secondary cystic abscess in right lateral of brain which was cause of death.*"

Driver Ernest Richardson McComb died at 2 am on 9th January, 1917 at Fort Pitt Military Hospital, Chatham, Kent, England from Pneumonia & Appendicitis.

A death for Ernest McCoombe, aged 21, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Medway, Kent, England.

Driver Ernest Richardson McComb was buried on 12th January, 1917 in Fort Pitt Military Cemetery, Rochester, Kent, England – Plot number 1429 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

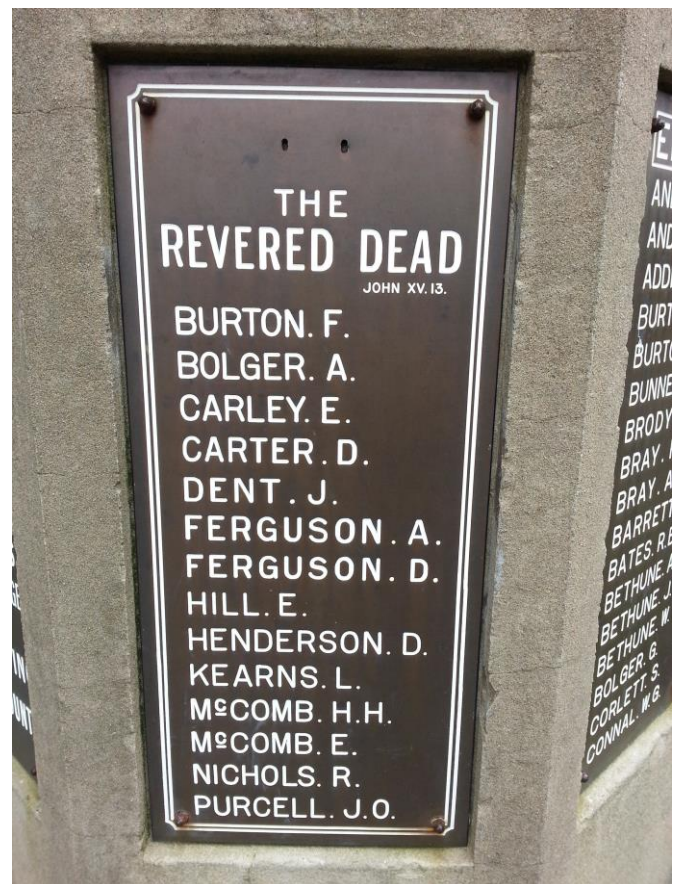
Driver Ernest Richardson McComb was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Driver McComb's father - Mr T. K. McComb, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll sent February, 1922 & Plaque sent August, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Driver Ernest Richardson McComb – service number 22927, aged 20, of 3rd Div. Ammunition Col., Australian Field Artillery. He was the son of Thomas Kerr McComb and Harriet McComb. Native of Frankston, Victoria, Australia.

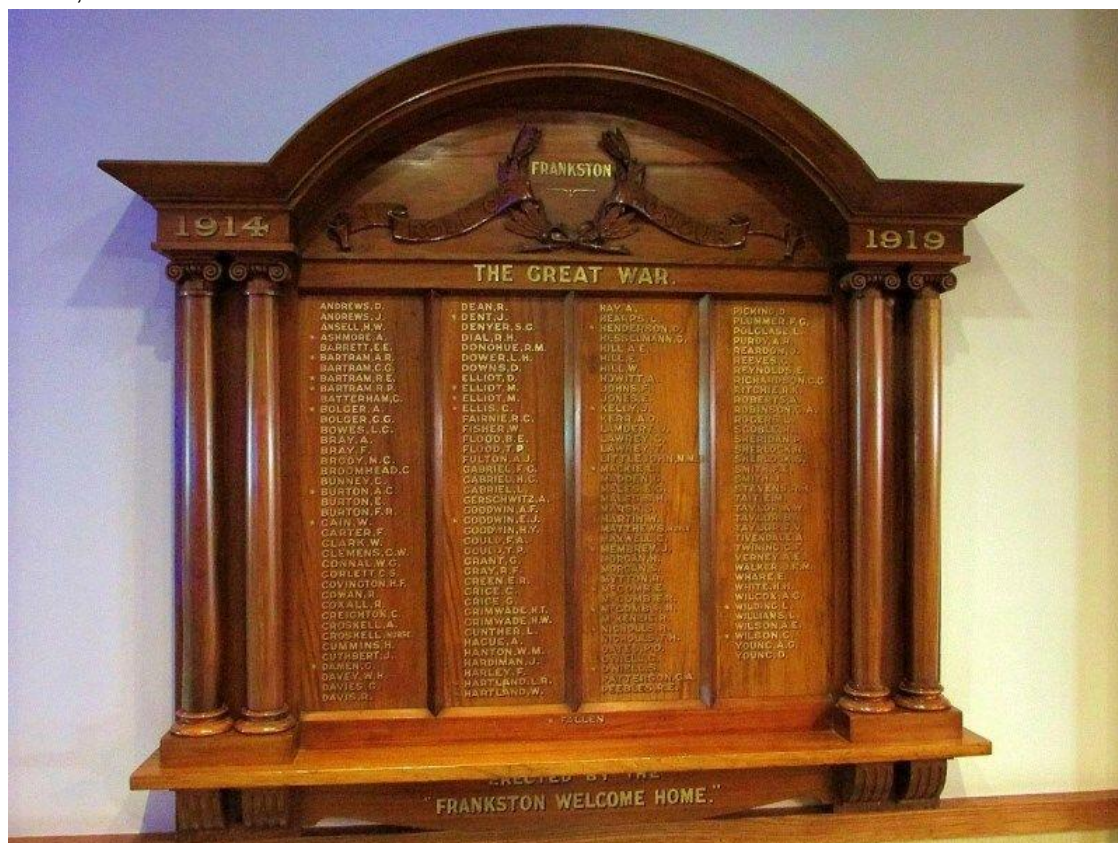
E. McComb is remembered on the Frankston Primary School War Memorial, located at Davey Street, Frankston, Victoria.

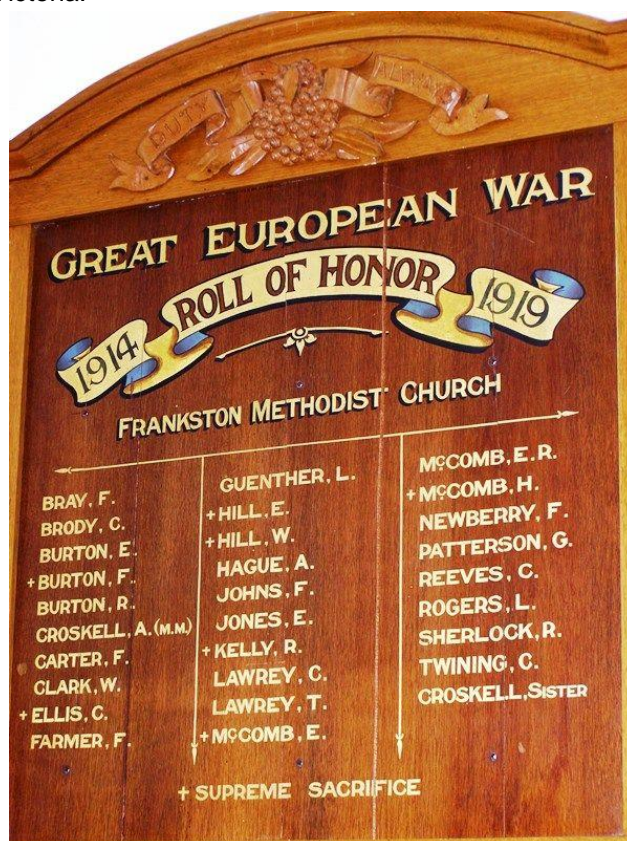


E. R. McComb is remembered on the Frankston Honour Roll which is located at Frankston RSL, 183 Cranbourne Road, Frankston, Victoria.

DIED ON SERVICE

McCOMB – On the 9th January, 1917 at Fort Pitt Hospital, London, Ernest Richardson, dearly beloved youngest son of Thomas and Harriet McComb, "Wyahala," Kars Street, Frankston, aged 20 years.

General regret was expressed in Frankston on Saturday when it became known that word had been received by the parents of Private Ernie McComb that he had succumbed to an attack of appendicitis followed by pneumonia, in England. "Ernie" was a general favourite and being a native of Frankston was known by all. He was not a very strong lad and was refused three times before finally being accepted, but he had made up his mind to go and "do his bit" for his country and nothing would stop him. We sympathise sincerely with his parents in their sad loss.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

Fort Pitt Military Cemetery, Rochester, Kent, England

Fort Pitt Military Cemetery, Rochester, Kent contains 289 identified Commonwealth War Graves.

During both wars there were naval and military establishments in the neighbourhood of Rochester, and some fishing and shipping at the port.

Fort Pitt Military Cemetery contains a plot of 266 First World War graves. The 25 Second World War graves (two of them unidentified) are north of the plot. All save two of them are together in a group.
