George Bell ROGERS

George Bell Rogers was born at Forbes, New South Wales on 8th June, 1877 to parents Robert Bell & Harriet Rogers (nee Foster).

George Bell Rogers attended Bathurst Public School, New South Wales.

George Bell Rogers married Jane Mary Fitzgerald in Sydney, New South Wales on 15th May, 1899.

George Bell Rogers was a 39 year old, married, Wagon driver from Parramatta, New South Wales when he enlisted on 20th January, 1917 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His religion was Church of England & his next of kin was listed as his wife – Mrs J. M. Rogers, of Inkerman Street, Parramatta, NSW.

Private George Bell Rogers, Service number 7308, embarked from Sydney, NSW on RMS *Osterley* on 10th February, 1917 with the 1st Infantry Battalion, 24th Reinforcements & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 11th April, 1917.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private George Bell Rogers was marched in to 1st Training Battalion at Durrington, Wiltshire on 11th April, 1917.

Private George Bell Rogers was admitted to Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire on 26th May, 1917.

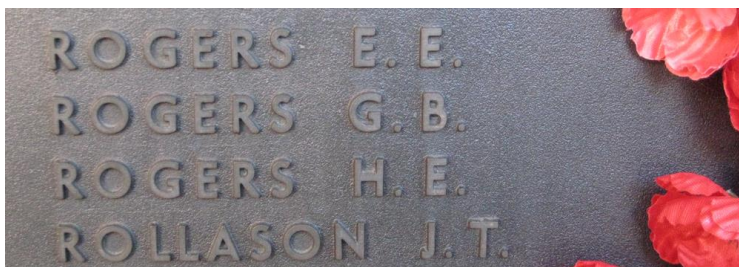
Private George Bell Rogers died at 9.20 a.m. on 2nd June, 1917 at Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire, England from Broncho Pneumonia.

A death for George B. Rogers, aged 39, was registered in the June quarter, 1917 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire, England.

Private George Bell Rogers was buried on 5th June, 1917 at Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire, England – Plot number 247 and now has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

From the burial report of Private George Bell Rogers – *Military Funeral, Coffin was Elm. The Rector of Durrington undertakes that this grave shall be cared for and he will gladly answer any enquiries.*

Private G. B. Rogers is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 30.

Private George Bell Rogers was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Private Rogers' widow – Mrs J. M. Rogers (sent September, 1922 & August, 1922)

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private George Bell Rogers – service number 7308 as being 39 years old & served with 1st Battalion Australian Infantry. He was the son of Robert and Harriet Rogers, husband of Jane Mary Rogers, of Inkerman St, Parramatta, New South Wales. Born at Forbes, New South Wales.

A War Pension was granted to Jane Mary Rogers, widow of late Private George Bell Rogers, in the sum of £2 per fortnight from 6th August, 1917. War Pensions were also granted to late Private George Bell Rogers' two daughters – Kathleen Rogers - £1 per fortnight & Vera Rogers – 15/- per fortnight.

ROGERS. — Died of illness in England, June 2nd, 1917, Private G. B. Rogers, of Inkerman-street, Parramatta, aged 39 years. He did his duty nobly. Sadly missed by his loving wife and mother and four daughters.

BRAVE BOYS WHO HAVE DIED FOR THEIR COUNTRY

PRIVATE J. BENTLEY late of Church-street, Parramatta, killed in action in France May 13th, 1917. During his residence in Parramatta he was for a time employed by Messrs. Summons and Graham. He was a close friend of Private G. B. Rogers, whose death from pneumonia is announced in this issue.

PRIVATE G. B. ROGERS – Mrs G. M. Rogers, of Inkerman-street, Parramatta, has been officially notified that her husband Private G. B. Rogers, who enlisted on the 20th January and sailed from Sydney on the 10th February, 1917, died on the 2nd June, aged 39 years, from broncho-pneumonia at Fargo military hospital.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government. *(Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921)*

Private G. B. Rogers does have a personal inscription on his headstone.

Three Little Words Forget Him Not By His Loving Wife And Daughters

Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire, England

Durrington Cemetery contains burials of both wars. The 204 First World War burials were mostly from nearby Larkhill Camp. Many of the graves are of Australian servicemen and there is a separate Australian memorial in the cemetery. The Second World War burials number 22. In addition to the war graves, there are a number of post-war service graves in the cemetery, mostly of the Royal Air Force.

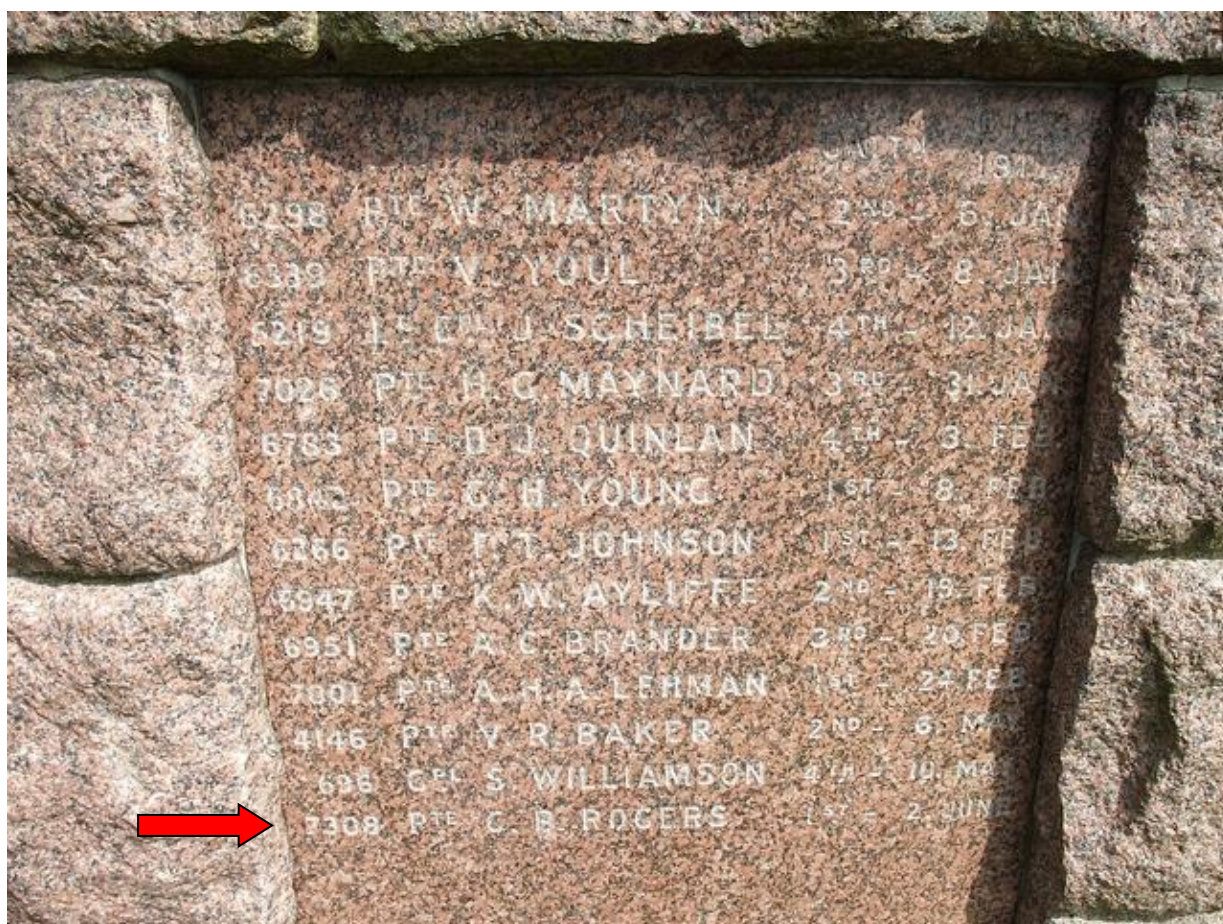
