Arthur Bede WADDUPS

Arthur Waddups was born on 27th August, 1889 in Nyngan, NSW to parents Frederick Daniel & Ellen Waddups (nee Mackay).

Arthur Bede Waddups married Alice Maude Luby in Sydney, NSW in September, 1908.

A birth was registered in 1909 for Cecilia E. D. Waddups, daughter of Arthur & Alice Waddups. Cecilia Waddups died on 24th November, 1909.

From the NSW Police Gazette – 2 February, 1910:

Deserting Wives and Families, Service, etc

Sydney – A warrant has been issued by the Central Police Bench for the arrest of Arthur Waddups, charged with wife desertion. He is 23 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, slight build, dark complexion, clean shaved, one tooth missing from front upper jaw; usually dressed in a dark coat and vest, light trousers, and straw hat. Complainant, Alice Waddups, 27, Corben-street, Sydney,

From the NSW Police Gazette – 6 April, 1910:

Deserting Wives and Families, Service, etc

Sydney – A warrant has been issued by the Central Police Bench for the arrest of Arthur Bede Waddups, charged with disobeying a magisterial order for the support of his wife (£3 due). He is 21 years of age, 5 feet 4 inches high, medium build, dark complexion, clean shaved; dressed in brown clothes and straw hat; a coach builder.

Arthur Bede Waddups was sent to Darlinghurst Gaol on 10th May, 1912 & convicted of Wife desertion at Redfern P.C.. He was sentenced to 22/6 weekly and Sureties or 12 months imprisonment. Arthur Bede Waddups was 5 ft 5 ¼ inches tall with brown hair, blue eyes. He had a scar on the inside left forearm, his right wrist had been broken and he had a brown mole on his left cheek.

Arthur Bede Waddups was a 25 year old, married, Coachbuilder when he enlisted on 8th September, 1914 with the Australian Imperial Force (A.I.F.). His service number was 2438 & his religion was Roman Catholic. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs E. Waddups, of 178 Wattle Road, Pyrmont, Sydney, NSW. Arthur Waddups stated on his Attestation Papers that he had been apprenticed to E. J. Pope, of Ultimo for 5 years. His last employer was G. H. Olding, Parramatta Road, Forest Lodge, Sydney, NSW where he had worked in Coach Building Trade (Body Maker) for 3 years. (Note – Surname was recorded as Waddup on the Embarkation Roll)

[Note – some of the forms in the Service Record file have the surname as 'Waddupp', however the research listed below will use the correct spelling of "Waddups".]

Arthur Bede Waddups was posted to Divisional Ammunition Column as Wheeler Sergeant on 8th September, 1914 for recruit training.

Wheeler Sergeant Arthur Bede Waddup (name as per Embarkation Roll) embarked from Sydney, NSW on HMAT Argylshire (A8) on 18th October, 1914 with the No. 1 Section Divisional Ammunition Column.

Wheeler Sergeant Arthur Bede Waddups joined the M.E.F. (Mediterranean Expeditionary Force) on 30th April, 1915.

Wheeler Sergeant Arthur Bede Waddups was reduced to the ranks by Field Court Martial held at Camp Cleopatra on 1st June, 1915 for being absent without leave.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was written up for a Crime on 21st June, 1915 – Breaking Camp at Camp Cleopatra. He was awarded 7 days F.P. (Field Punishment) No. 2.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was written up for a Crime on 6th October, 1915 – Breaking out of Camp & Disobedience of Orders on 5th October, 1915 while posted at Camp Cleopatra, Alexandria. He was awarded 4 days F.P. (Field Punishment) No. 2.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was sent to Hospital on 1st February, 1916 then transferred to Hospital at Cairo on 2nd February, 1916 with Venereal Disease. He was discharged on 14th March, 1916 to Ghizeh.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was transferred to 10th Field Artillery Brigade on 26th March, 1916. He was taken on strength of 10th F.A.B. at Tel-el-Kebir & posted to 38th Battery on 26th March, 1916.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups proceeded to join B.E.F. from Alexandria on HMT *Ivernia* on 5th June, 1916. He disembarked at Marseilles, France on 12th June, 1916.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was sent sick to 4th Australian Field Ambulance on 29th September, 1916 – cause N.Y.D. (not yet determined). He was transferred to 10th Casualty Clearing Station in Belgium on 30th September, 1916 then transferred to 25th Ambulance Train the same day suffering from Influenza. Gunner Waddups was admitted to 8th Stationary Hospital at Wimereux on 30th September, 1916. He was discharged to Details at Etaples, France on 6th October, 1916.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was admitted to 26th General Hospital at Etaples on 13th October, 1916 with Colic & discharged to Base on 22nd October, 1916.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was admitted to 26th General Hospital on 12th November, 1916 with Influenza & discharged to No. 6 Convalescent Camp on 17th November, 1916. Gunner Waddups was medically classified as A (fit for Active Service) & discharged to Details Camp on 19th November, 1916.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was transferred to 4th Divisional Ammunition Column & taken on strength on 24th November, 1916.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was admitted to Field Ambulance on 27th November, 1916. He was transferred to 21st Casualty Clearing Station on 28th November, 1916 with Debility then transferred to No. 7 Ambulance Train. Gunner Waddups was admitted to 3rd Stationary Hospital with Debility on 29th November, 1916 then transferred & admitted to 25th Stationary Hospital at Rouen, France on 5th December, 1916 with suspected Enteric. He was reported as seriously ill on 10th December, 1916. Gunner Waddups was transferred to 9th General Hospital at Rouen, France on 15th December, 1916. He was reported to have an abscess of the liver on 17th December, 1916.

Gunner Waddups embarked from Havre, France on 31st December, 1916 on Hospital Ship *Valdivia* suffering from Pleurisy effusion.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was admitted to 3rd Western General Hospital, Cardiff, Wales on 1st January, 1917 with Pleural Effusion.

A Medical Report was completed on Wheeler Sergeant (rank as listed on Medical Report) Arthur Bede Waddups on 24th January, 1917 at 3rd Western General Hospital, Cardiff, Wales. His disability was listed as amoebic abscess of Liver which had originated in May, 1915 at Lemnos. *"1/1/17 Admitted to 3rd Western General Hospital Cardiff from France with a diagnosis of Pleurisy. On examination there was a lump at lower border of chest on rt side which was tender. It was diagnosed as amoebic lower abscess. There was no previous history of dysentery but patient had what he considered to be slight dysentery at Lemnos May 1915. Although he did not report sick with it he had Trench Fever in France Oct 1916 (Boulogne 8 days). Rejoined for duty Nov 22nd again sent to No. _ HP Rouen whence he was transferred to 3 W. G. Hosp. 1/1/17."* Wheeler Sergeant Waddups disability was caused by amoeba of dysentery which was caused by active service. He was operated on for drainage of liver abscess. The Medical Board recommended that Wheeler Sergeant Waddups was unfit for War Service. Home Service or Light Duty at Home. The Medical Officer at 3rd Western General Hospital, Cardiff completed Army Form D. 400A "Descriptive Return of a Soldier discharged on account of Disability" on 24th January, 1917. Arthur Bede Waddups' intended address on discharge was listed as 331 Harris St, Pyrmont, Sydney, NSW. His father's name was recorded as Frederick; his mother's name as Ellen; his wife's maiden name in full was listed as Alice Luby & it was recorded they had married in September, 1909 in Sydney. (NSW BDM's have the marriage registered in 1908). Arthur Bede Waddups' rank on discharge was listed as Fitter. His place & date of birth was listed as Nyngan, NSW 27th August, 1890. (NSW BDM's have the birth registered in 1889).

Mrs E. Waddups, of 178 Wattle Road, Pyrmont, Sydney, mother of Fitter (rank as per notification) A. B. Waddups, was advised on 12th December, 1916 that her son was seriously ill with suspected Enteric. Mrs Waddups was advised on 1st January, 1917 that her son had been removed from the seriously ill list. She was advised on the 4th January, 1917 that his condition was listed as stationary.

Mrs Alice Maud Waddups, of 63 Morris Street, Summer Hill, Sydney, NSW, wife of Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, wrote to Base Records on 15th February, 1917 asking if Fitter Arthur Bede Waddups was returning to Australian in Mach. *"As I am his wife and he has left his mother next-of-kin I never get any news of his whereabouts. I am receiving £1-2-6 per week allotment pay from him, but have not heard from him sent [since] he embarked in October, 1914. He has been ill with fever, & his mother said he was coming home. I would be very glad if you could furnish me with any particulars, if it is possible for you to do so."* Base Records replied to Mrs A. M. Waddups stating that Fitter A. B. Waddups condition had been listed as *"Seriously ill, suspected enteric. Removed from seriously ill list. Condition stationary."* Base Records advised that Fitter Waddups had enlisted as a married man and recorded his mother as next-of-kin but if she desired her name to be noted on his records her Marriage Lines would need to be forwarded to Base Record so that amendments could be made. Mrs A. M. Waddups forwarded her Marriage Lines on 28th February, 1917 to Base Records to have her name recorded as the next-of-kin. Base Records acknowledged the letter sent by Mrs A. M. Waddups & added her name to the records of Fitter A. B. Waddups, 10th Field Artillery Brigade as *"stated to be wife."*

Mrs A. M. Waddups, of 63 Morris Street, Summer Hill, Sydney, NSW, wife of Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, was advised on 20th March, 1917 that Fitter A. B. Waddups, 4th Divisional Ammunition Column, was progressing favourably.

Mrs E. Waddups, of 178 Wattle Road, Pyrmont, Sydney, mother of Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, was advised on 20th March, 1917 that Fitter A. B. Waddups, 4th Divisional Ammunition Column, was progressing favourably.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups died on the afternoon of 1st April, 1917 at 3rd Western General Hospital, Cardiff, Wales from Pleural Effusion & Abscess of Liver.

A death for Arthur B. Waddups, aged 27, was registered in the June quarter, 1917 in the district of Cardiff, Glamorganshire, Wales.

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was buried on 5th April, 1917 in Cathays Cemetery, Cardiff, Wales – Plot number EB. 44 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone. From the burial report of Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups - *Coffin was Army contract coffin. A photograph of the funeral was taken by Mr Sargent, Photographer, Albany Rd., Cardiff; at Howard Gardens Hospital.*

The Red Cross Wounded & Missing file for Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups contains a request from the Red Cross on behalf of the relatives to obtain the any details concerning his last few hours and burial. Matron, of the 3rd Western General Hospital, Howard Gardens, Cardiff replied: *"In reply to your letter of April 28th, Arthur Waddups was admitted to this Hospital on January 1st from France, suffering from liver abscess. He was very ill and the abscess had to be drained. He improved very much and seemed much better, then he had a relapse, and the abscess had to be opened again. He seemed to be doing well and was very bright and cheery. On April 1st I saw him in the morning, he was quite cheerful and seemed fairly well, later in the day he died. He was buried in the Cardiff Cemetery, and we had a photograph taken of the wreath which the patients sent, and of the funeral leaving the Hospital. If you think the Mother would like copies of the photographs we will send htme to you. I thought the Sister of the ward had written to his Mother but find she was unable to obtain the address. Several of the patients went to the funeral. Private Waddups was so long in the ward that everyone was greatly attached to him. He was buried in the soldiers' portion of the Cardiff Cemetery, number of grave E.B. 44."*

A War Pension was granted to Alice Maud Waddups, 63 Morris St, Summer Hill, widow of the late Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, in the sum of £2 per fortnight granted from 7th June, 1917.

A War Pension was granted to Ellen Waddups, 298 Bulwarra Rd., Ultimo, NSW, mother of the late Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, in the sum of 5/- per fortnight granted from 8th June, 1917.

Alice Maud Waddups, of 63 Morris Street, Summer Hill, Sydney, NSW, widow Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, wrote to Base Records on 12th April, 1917 requesting that her late husband's personal belongings be returned to her.

Mrs Ellen Waddups, 298 Bulwarra Road, Ultimo, mother of the late Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, wrote to Base Records on 25th June, 1917 stating she was the next-of-kin of Wheeler Sergeant A. B. Waddups & she wished *"to claim all his personal effects when they are returned to Australia will you kindly see that they are forwarded to the above address and oblige."*

Mrs A. M. Waddups, Summer Hill, widow & Mrs E. Waddups, Ultimo, mother – of the late Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, were advised separately on 16th August, 1917 that Gunner Waddups had died at 3rd Western General Hospital, Cardiff on 1st April, 1917 of Pleural Effusion, Abscess of Liver & was buried in Cardiff Cemetery on 5th April, 1917.

Alice Maud Waddups, of 63 Morris Street, Summer Hill, Sydney, NSW, widow Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, wrote to Base Records on 25th September, 1917 enquiring if her late husband's personal belongings were to hand yet. Base Records replied on 1st October, 1917 that no personal effects had been received at their Office.

Alice Maud Waddups, widow Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, signed on 25th October, 1917 as receipt of 1 package of the effects of the late Sgt. (rank as listed) A. B. Waddups.

Mrs Ellen Waddups, 298 Bulwarra Road, Ultimo, mother of the late Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, wrote to Base Records on 27th November, 1917 stating it had been eight months since her son, the late No. 2438 Gunner A. B. Waddups had died & *"I would be pleased to know if his personal belongings and pay book have yet arrived..."* Base Records replied that a package of personal effects of her son had been despatched on 19th October, 1917 to his wife. The Pay book would in due course be returned to the District Paymaster, Victoria Barracks, Paddington, NSW, who would retain it as a record.

Alice Maud Waddups, of 63 Morris Street, Summer Hill, Sydney, NSW, widow Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups, wrote to Base Records on 18th December, 1917 asking for advice concerning the fact that her husband who had died from illness without making a Will & “as he left his mother next-of-kin, can she put in a claim for his deferred pay. I have letters sent back to me with his personal effects that he had received from his mother urging him to make a will in her favour so as to prevent me from getting his money. He was on active service over two years & for twelve months I received £1-8-0 per week & later my money was reduced to £1-2-6 per week until his death, will you let me know if she can make a claim for his pay...”

Base Records contacted Mrs E. Waddups, of 298 Bullwara Road, Ultimo, in February, 1921 asking if there were any nearer blood relatives than herself in regards to her son, due to the “Deceased Soldiers Estates Act 1918” which stated that the War Medals & Mementoes of a deceased soldier were to be handed in the following order of relationship – Widow, eldest surviving son, eldest surviving daughter, father, mother, eldest surviving brother, eldest surviving sister etc.

Base Records wrote to 2nd Military District on 15th May, 1922 requesting the names, addresses & relationship of the claimants for the War Gratuity in connection with the late Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups so that the war medals etc issuable of account of the soldier could be disposed of. The Gratuity Section, 2nd District Base replied on 25th May, 1922 stating that “... the War Gratuity due in respect of the services of the abovenamed deceased soldier was paid to his widow – Alice M. Waddups of 5 Smith St., Summer Hill, New South Wales. A claim received from his mother – Ellen Waddups of 298 Bulwarra Road, Ultimo, Sydney, NSW, - was rejected by the War Gratuity Board. There is no information contained in the records here to warrant the widow’s clam for war medals etc., being ignored.”

Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups was entitled to 1914/15 Star, British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Gunner Waddups’ widow – Mrs A. M. Waddups, as the closest next-of-kin. (Scroll & Plaque sent January, 1923). A note, dated 14th July, 1922, in the Service Record file for Gunner Arthur Bede Waddups states that the Memorial Plaque was incorrectly spelt as Waddups

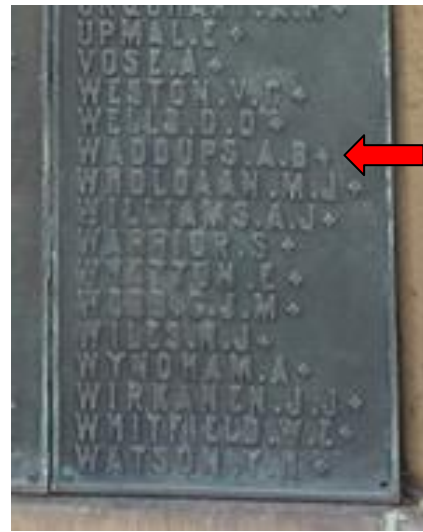

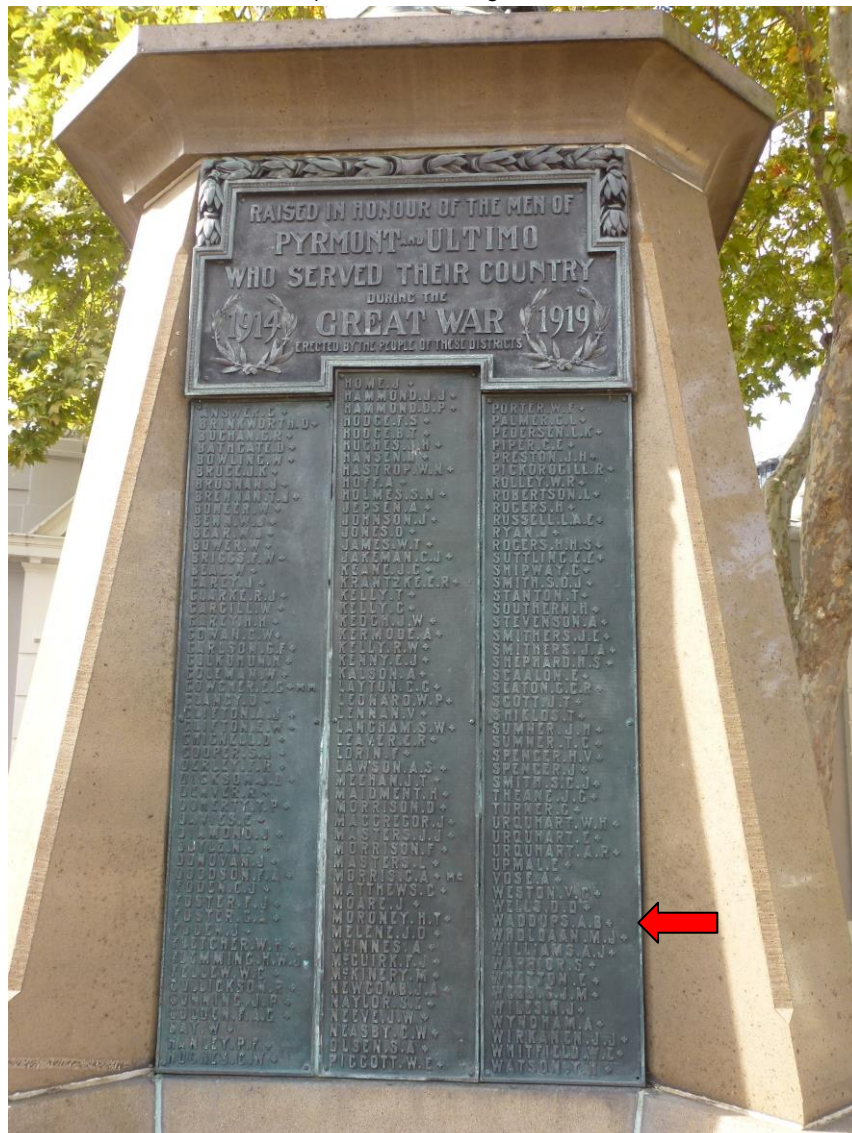


Roll Of Honour WW1 Australian War Memorial Canberra, Australia

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

(Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921)

A letter from Base Records, dated 26th August, 1921, to Mrs A. M. Waddups, of 63 Morris Street, Summer Hill, NSW, wife of the late Gunner Waddups, advised that a letter from the Defence Dept. concerning an inscription on the headstone of the late Gunner A. B. Waddups had not been answered & non-receipt of a reply within 21 days would have to be accepted as indicating that no further action was to be taken.

Gunner A. B. Waddups does not have a personal inscription on his headstone.

Cathays Cemetery, Cardiff, Wales

During the 1939-1945 War, the city of Cardiff was one of the Royal Naval bases of the Western Approaches Command. It was severely damaged by enemy air attack during the early part of the 1939-1945 War and has been largely rebuilt. The cemetery, known locally as Cathays Cemetery was opened in 1859 and has been extended to cover over 100 acres. The cemetery contains war graves of both world wars. Just over a third of the 1914-1918 burials are contained in a War Graves Plot in the portion of Section EB, this plot is on two converging roadways leading to the main entrance. The remainder of the graves are scattered in other parts of the cemetery. After the 1914-1918 War, a Cross of Sacrifice was erected in front of the plot in the angle formed by the junction of the two roadways, the whole forming a triangular island site. The 1939-1945 War burials are scattered throughout the cemetery in more than 30 different sections. A number of them are airmen who came from the Royal Air Force stations at Cardiff and St. Athan. There are now nearly 500, 1914-1918 and over 200, 1939-1945 war casualties commemorated in this site. Some 40 French and Norwegian Foreign Nationals are also commemorated here.

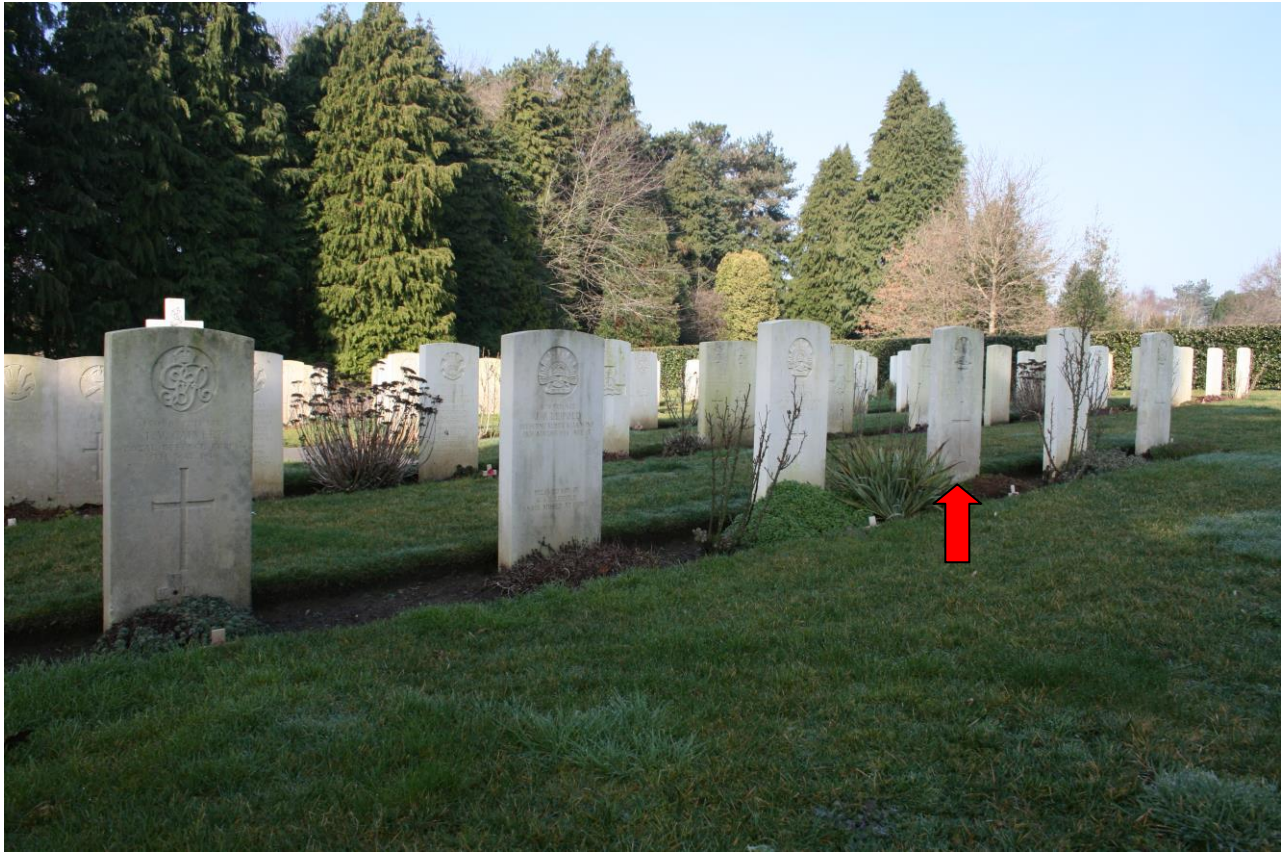

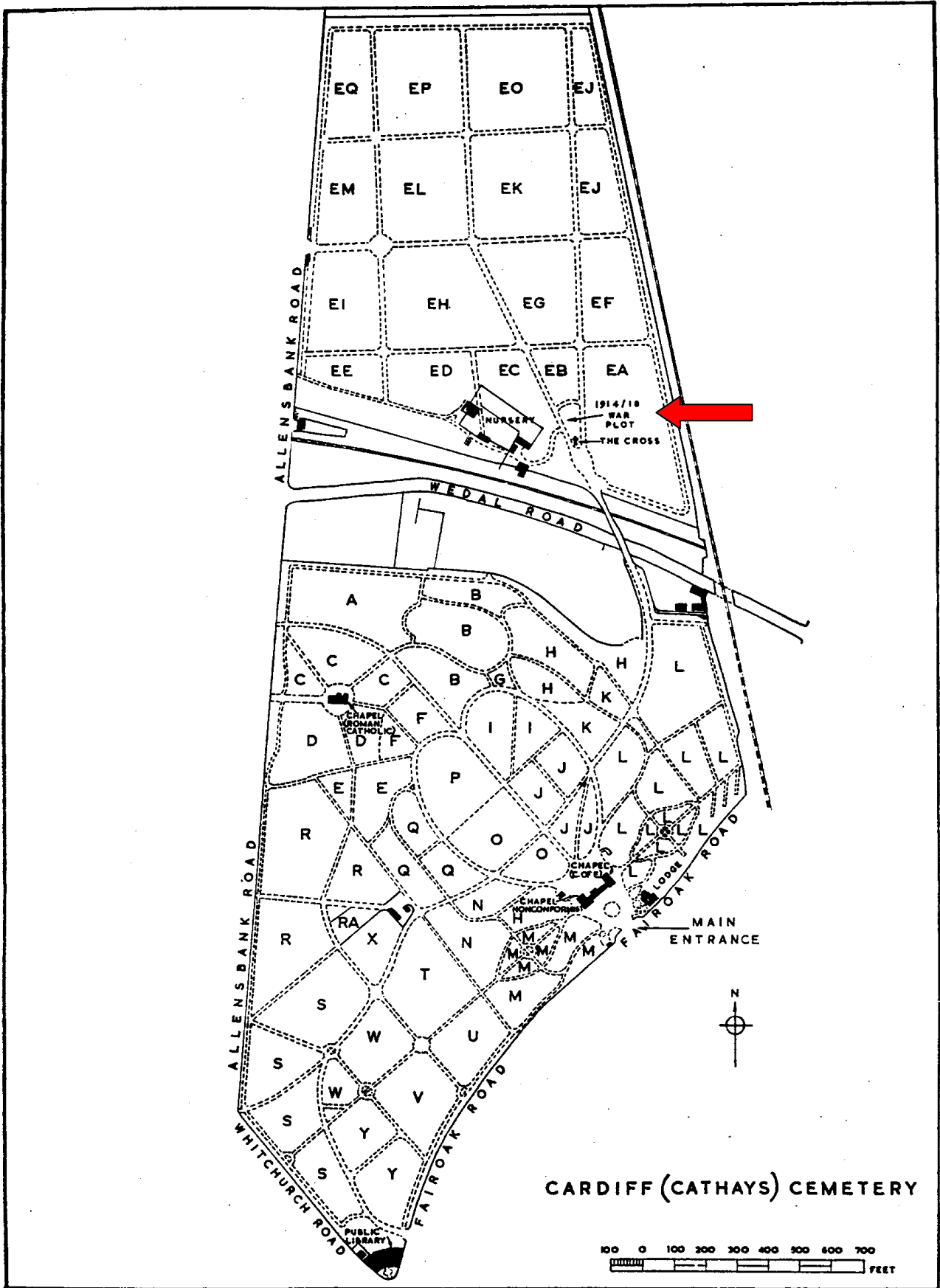
